

## GUIDELINES FOR SUBMITTING ARTICLES TO THE CHINESE (TAIWAN) YEARBOOK OF INTERNATIONAL LAW AND AFFAIRS

The *Chinese (Taiwan) Yearbook of International Law and Affairs* ("Yearbook") commenced publication in 1981 under the auspices of the Chinese (Taiwan) Society of International Law. The Yearbook publishes on multi-disciplinary topics with a focus on international and comparative law issues regarding Taiwan, Mainland China and cross-strait relations. The Yearbook invites submissions of unsolicited articles, comments, case analyses and book reviews.

### **Submission of manuscripts**

Please send an electronic version of your manuscript by e-mail to the Editorial Board, at: [csil@seed.net.tw](mailto:csil@seed.net.tw). The attachment should contain the manuscript, a cover letter and a resume. While electronic submissions are strongly preferred, submissions may be made by post alternatively. ### **Layout of manuscripts**

Submissions should be typewritten in Microsoft Word format. The maximum length of manuscripts is not limited. The Yearbook encourages submissions of manuscripts under 25,000 words, the equivalent of 50 journal pages, texts and footnotes included. We prefer manuscripts with double-spaced text and footnotes in 12-point Times New Roman font. The *Pinyin* system of translation should be used in reference to publications in Chinese.

### **Copyright**

Copyright in the work shall remain the property of the publisher. The authors will have the right to reproduce their article in other publishing works. On written request, the publisher will give the copyright authorisation. Translations can also be reproduced as long as the original work is credited.
